d. Footsteps: Sadness that the PCC had to make the very difficult decision that Footsteps needed to close as it was not viable as a business due to the impact of the pandemic and the life of the building was at an end.

The closure has financial implications for us as a Church Family. As Footsteps has been making a loss there is no money in the Footsteps account to cover redundancy payments, which will need to be made in April, or for the clearance of the site, which will be done in the summer school holidays. The site belongs to the council and the school do not want the building, and the building is in a poor state of repair (coming to the end of it's life) and so it needs to be safely removed. This will cost us a significant amount of money.

The closure of Footsteps will cost the Church family in the region of £40K, which is what the PCC have budgeted. As we do not have this amount of money in the bank as a lump sum we are taking out a interest-free year long bridging loan. Due to this bridging loan taking legal priority we shall withhold this year's Parish Share and pay this loan off first. There will also be an opportunity for people to choose to commit to give monthly for a year towards this loan to. For some that will be important in helping Footsteps to end well.

There may be safeguarding issues as there are multiple rooms in the vicarage so would require a greater number on the team to ensure full safeguarding.

Vicars reflections on God at work in the life of St Andrew's during 2022

Adapting ministries in response to our community:

- Sunday worship continues to be held at 10am with this being it's general pattern of worship:
 - o 1st Sunday: All Age Holy Communion
 - \circ 2nd / 4th / 5th: Morning Worship with a kids group
 - $\circ\quad 3^{rd}:$ Holy Communion with a kids group
- Thursday services on the 1st (Celtic) & 3rd (Holy Communion) at 2.30pm.
- Thursday 345pm weekly service, which tends to be an All Age service.
- 3 weekly daily offices: Morning Prayer (MP), Evening Prayer (EP) and Night Prayer (NP) mainly led by lay people.
- Youth Group on Sunday evenings at 6.30pm
- Fortnightly 'Church Update Email' instead of weekly. This has a Biblical reflection and prayer responses for people to engage with as well as being our main source of communication.
- Wiggle Tots started on a Thursday from September 2022.

God at work in people's lives

- 150 households have now registered for our weekly 'Church Update Email' but generally only 128 are opened (134 in 2021).
- 2 new ordinand started training in September 2022: Abby Latham-Holt and Crai Giles.
- 1 person is still in the vocation process with their Stage 2 in June 2023.

God at work in mission

- CAP Job Club has run a number of times this year.
- Emmanuel Community (new worshipping community) has now been invited to plant into Radcliffe Primary School and is now established within the Manchester Diocese 'Antioch Network' as Emmanuel Community Church.

God's provision

- Financially a demanding year:
 - Only paid £3K of £39,500 Parish Share to the Diocese.
 - Paid the costs of closing Footsteps and making the ground 'good' after leaving the site.
- Increased giving: Moved most people from the envelope scheme to Standing orders.
- Envelope giving was much higher than expected
- Ended the year in a stable place with no outstanding debts.

• A brilliant PCC to work with over the past year, making good decisions in difficult circumstances.

The things as church leader that I'm lamenting over:

- Funerals for church family members
- Missing the kids who have not returned, with their parents.

Things as church leader I'm praying about:

- How do we continue to grow our church family?
- What is God calling us to do in this next year?

Church Wardens

This past year has been successful although we have seen a fall in numbers on a Sunday. The Thursday services are proving successful and there is a great team in place assisting Rev Jo, David and I.

The services over Christmas went well as did the Easter services. During these busy periods the team split the workload and with assistance from the reserve Church Wardens all services were covered.

The vicarage has been cleared and is again being utilised for children's groups as required on a Sunday.

The local volunteer litter pickers have visited the church every couple of months and cleared the church grounds, at the cost of a cup of tea. The Wardens try to clear up as much rubbish as possible, time and weather permitting before the Sunday service.

The church wardens are usually on site just after 0900 on a Sunday if anyone has nay queries or issues they would like to discuss. In addition, there is a new notebook at the church that can be utilised to record any concerns or faults.

We would like to thank Hannah, Harish and Raynor for their support and help over the 12 months.

<u>Treasurer's Report</u> Year ended 31st December 2022

2022 began differently; energy price hikes & a cost of living crisis loomed...

We also had to quickly plan a costly strategy for revitalising or closing our Footsteps Nursery (at St Andrews primary school). A team was formed to crunch the numbers – with these options the PCC decided to close down the business, with a demolition and redundancies strategy. The numbers were projected, and funding the potential costs should be covered almost in full if we were to cease paying the Parish share in 2022. The Diocese has struggled with the amount of Parish share they have received from all congregations, and we understand that this is a big loss to them, but understandably this was the only option for us to pay for the closure ourselves. We paid just £2,730 (7% of Parish Share) in 2022.

Pre-empting large payments such as redundancy payments and demolition we borrowed £20,000 for cash flow purposes, agreeing to payback 12x monthly from June 2022. By Gods guide & grace, the teams costings remained accurate, the work done with staff, school &

contractors was amazing and we came in under budget on the project. The loan was paid back in full November 2022.

Building & Ground

There have been several ongoing issues during 2022/23, which has seen a few contractor visits and on-going repairs.

Due to on-going vandalism, we contacted our insurance company and had the cellar stairs repaired, utilising masonry that was found scattered around the church grounds. In addition, we had the external light outside the vestry door repaired and a drainpipe replaced that had been deliberately snapped.

As part of the battle with vandalism and potential robbery we have contacted SmartWater, a company that produces a DNA solution that protect internal equipment and valuables along with external lead and equipment. Although the external signage has been damaged and removed.

In December we had a couple of companies visit the church to survey a few stained-glass windows. The large south facing window was condemned with the recommendation it was surveyed by a masonry company. A smaller second window to the organ room was repaired as required. A subsequent visit by a masonry company fully condemned the windows stonework; the internal area has been cordoned of as storage space and the under 5 play area moved to the north side of the building.

In addition, during December a specialist rope company visited the church and cleared out all the guttering and managed a couple of small repairs. The company have highlighted a number of repairs that are required to areas of the roof, this is on-going.

During the year, we have managed the usual maintenance work, with repairs to the alarm system, PAT testing, and fire extinguisher checks. The boiler repair is due but has not yet been scheduled. This will be done when a timeslot can be confirmed.

Moving forward there are some big decisions to be made about repairs to the building. The south facing window will need some work, even if just to make safe. The roof needs repairing, and a new contractor identified for this work. We are still waiting for a security cage to be added to the external cellar doors. The external wall is leaning, the East side was identified a couple of years ago and the West side has started to buckle in places. The building is being vandalised on a regular basis, not all of it as obvious as smashed lights and drainpipes.

I would like to thank Rev. Bob May for his assistance over the past 12 months.

Emmanuel Community

Emmanuel Community is church plant which is part of the Antioch Network. We meet weekly on a Sunday afternoon at St Philips Community Centre. We began meeting there on Easter Sunday, which was a fabulous first meeting with 37 of us worshipping together.

Our all-age services have a relaxed friendly style. We serve hot drinks and biscuits as people arrive. We have quiz's and watch videos about Jesus, with simple prayers and crafts. We also have a "thought for the day" where we think about how the story applies to our lives. There is a lively family atmosphere.

New people are coming along and coming to know Jesus. Our numbers fluctuate greatly, ranging from eight to thirty-nine, with an average of 13. We have two weekly home groups and a strong emphasis on pastoral care. A group of us are attending a ladies retreat this month, and in the summer some of us we are going on a weekend away with other Antioch churches. We hope to have some picnics in the park as the weather gets warmer, and we have just began a Drop-In Coffee morning at St Phillips on a Monday morning.

Celebration of a Child

It's a joy to be involved with this ministry at St Andrews. I am the first point of contact for people when they are considering 'A Celebration of the Gift of a Child' which includes Baptism and a Thanksgiving Service. It also provides information on how a Thanksgiving differs without the anointment of Holy water as in a Baptism Service but is just as important in acknowledging their ongoing commitment to faith for their child.

Under the Celebration of a Child ministry a Baptism is held at our 10am service and Thanksgiving Services are held privately at 12 noon service by prior arrangement.

CAP Job Club
